In 2016, Panama had 1300 new HIV infections and <1000 AIDS-related deaths. There were 21 000 people living with HIV in 2016, among whom 54% were accessing antiretroviral therapy.

The key populations most affected by HIV in Panama are:

- Sex workers, with an HIV prevalence of 2%.
- Men who have sex with men, with an HIV prevalence of 13.06%.
- Transgender people, with an HIV prevalence of 15%.
- Prisoners, with an HIV prevalence of 6.4%.

Since 2010, new HIV infections have increased by 9% and AIDS-related deaths have increased by 20%.

Since 2016, the Ministry of Health has provided free HIV treatment for all. The country is making decisive steps to increase HIV testing, with a national campaign launched for the first time in 2015. Panama has offered free HIV testing for pregnant women, key populations and adolescents since 2016.
